Why? Because I Said So

The Duties of Parents and Children Continuation of the Table of Duties1

For Parents. Ye fathers, provoke not your children to wrath, but bring them up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord. Eph. 6:4.

God works through means. For example, our Father in heaven provides us our bodies, food, clothing, shelter, etc. - but He does this through the means of parents and other authorities. Parents are to care for, discipline, and teach the faith to their children, while not provoking them to wrath. This is God's will. He wants all parents to teach their children His Word – The 10 Commandments, The Gospel, etc. If you look at our catechism, each chief part begins with these words, "As the head of the family should teach them in a simple way to his household." Parents teach and pass on the faith, and this happens in the home. It is through the means of parents that God cares for, disciplines, and catechizes (instructs) His children.

For Children. Children, obey your parents in the Lord; for this is right. Honor thy father and mother; which is the first commandment with promise: that it may be well with thee, and thou mayest live long on the earth. Eph. 6:1-3.

We, children, should fear and love God that we may not despise nor anger our parents and masters, but give them honor, serve, obey, and hold them in love and esteem. Parents are God given authorities. As we have seen above, parents provide so much for children. Children should ponder just how much God has given them through their parents. This should result in a grateful heart that is willing to honor, love, serve, and obey. If a child disobeys a parent, he or she really disobeys God. Unless a parent commands a child to sin, a child should always obey the parent. Why? Because, God lovingly says so. We all have seen the child who refuses to obey his parents. He leaves the home and refuses to obey other authorities in the world and maybe ends up in jail, in trouble, or doesn't live long on the earth. In reality, he is refusing to listen to and obey God. Therefore, it is so important that parents discipline their children and that children obey their parents because this has both temporal and eternal consequences.

As we continue to study the *Table of Duties*, we are reminded that these are God given. God places us in different vocations (callings), e.g. parent, child, worker, etc. - and wants us to do certain things. Keep in mind that whenever God tells us to do something – that is Law and not Gospel. The Law of God does three things: 1.

It serves as a *curb* to keep order in the world. A world without Law would be chaos. 2. It serves as a *mirror* to show us what we should do to get to heaven, but don't do. Therefore, it reflects that we are sinners and shows us that we can do nothing to save ourselves. This is the primary purpose of the Law. This makes way for the Gospel of Jesus Christ – salvation by grace alone, through faith alone, apart from the deeds of the Law. 3. It serves as a *guide* for our lives. What is God's will for us? Obey the Commandments – love God and love your neighbor, not out of guilt and fear, but from love of God, having been set free.

We must never think God's Law a harmful thing for us. God's 10 Commandments are meant for our good, not to harm us. The Law is only harmful if we misuse It and deceive ourselves into thinking we can work our way into heaven.

Parents, if you are thinking that you haven't cared for, disciplined, or catechized your children as you should – you are right. Children, if the 4th Commandment has shown you that you have failed to honor, serve, obey, and hold your parents in love and esteem as God commands – you see clearly. Parents and children alike (which includes the whole world) are sinners. Thanks be to God the Father that He sent His Son to take our place and live a sinless life under the demands of the Law. Thanks be to Jesus that He willingly kept the 4th Commandment for us and then went to the cross to pay for our breaking It.

Luke 2:51-52 ESV And he went down with them and came to Nazareth and was submissive to them. And his mother treasured up all these things in her heart. And Jesus increased in wisdom and in stature and in favor with God and man.

John 1:26 The next day he saw Jesus coming toward him, and said, "Behold, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world!

Since we are freed from the burden of the Law through Christ, we are free to love the Law and obey It because God lovingly says so.

August 2018 Newsletter Article

When it comes to stewardship, a favorite Bible verse is the account of the widow's mite (Luke 21:1–4). It's a moving account. Our Lord praises the seemingly small gift of two copper coins given by a poor widow above the abundance of gifts given by the rich, saying, "Truly, I tell you, this poor widow has put in more than all of them" (Luke 21:3).

And that is usually where we stop. But the text goes on. "For they all contributed out of their abundance, but she out of her poverty put in all she had to live on" (Luke 21:4).

"She ... put in all she had to live on." She gave everything. She held nothing back. She trusted that the Lord who made her and all creatures, who gave her everything she had, who redeemed her from her own sin, from death, and the power of the devil, who called her by the Gospel and enlightened her with His gifts of Word and Sacrament, would continue to do this. He would provide her with all that she needed for this body and life because that is the character of the God she had.

But this is not why we give small gifts. Her gift, though it appeared small, was actually large. When we are tempted to give small gifts it is precisely because we want them to be small! We don't trust the Lord to provide for us.

We give small gifts because we lack faith in the One who created us, redeemed us, sanctifies and keeps us in the one true faith. We give small gifts because we doubt that God will really give us what we need and desire. We give small gifts because we are not content with what God has already given.

We are not slaves, children of the slave woman, under the Old Covenant (Gal. 4). We are adopted sons of the free woman. And since we are sons, we are also heirs. And heirs receive the inheritance. For everything is already ours in Christ. And thus, moved by the willing spirit of adoption, we do the will of God in financial matters far beyond all that done by those under the Old Covenant who were forced by legal demands. So what have you decided to give? How do I decide what to give? Let the Scriptures be your guide.

We are to give proportionally to what we have received from God's giving to us (Luke 12:48; 1 Cor. 16:1-2, 2 Cor. 8:12). But you have not been set free to give nothing. See that you excel in the grace of giving (2 Cor. 8:7).

We are not free to live selfishly outside the Gospel, without regard for God who gives us all good gifts, without generosity for our neighbor who needs us and our gifts, without supporting the community of faith in which we live, without care for our spiritual fathers and those who teach and help raise our children in the faith, without resources for the poor and needy – in short, we are not free to live unto ourselves, hoarding what God has given us only for us.

For love is the fulfillment of the law (Romans 13:10). And the sum of the law is this: Love God and love your neighbor (Matt. 22:34-.40). We love because He first loved us. We give because He has given to us.

Luther once said, "Possessions belong in your hands, not in your heart" (LW 14:240). There is a reason your 10 fingers spread apart. With your hands you catch God's gifts for what you need and let the rest fall through your fingers to your neighbors – your family, your friends, your community, your church.

What should I be doing as a steward of the gifts the Lord has given me? Our *Small Catechism*, from Scripture, shows us our duties in our God-given vocations. Each month, I plan to cycle through parts of the *Table of Duties*:

Table of Duties Monthly Review: To Parents

Fathers, do not exasperate your children; instead, bring them up in the training and instruction of the Lord. **Eph. 6:4**

Table of Duties Monthly Review: To Children

Children, obey your parents in the Lord, for this is right. "Honor your father and mother"—which is the first commandment with a promise—"that it may go well with you and that you may enjoy long life on the earth." **Eph. 6:1–3**
